

Timely Tips from Your International Student Advisor: Katherine Worley

- Are you graduating at the end of fall term? Make sure you take the appropriate action before the deadline:
 - Request a Change of Level or Transfer to a new school
 - <u>Request OPT</u> (upcoming workshops linked below!)
 - <u>Depart the US</u>
- If you need more time in your academic program to complete degree requirements, be sure to <u>request an extension</u> before the program end date on your immigration document.



Support from OIS:

OIS is happy to serve our students and scholars through various modalities. Enhanced workshops, daily phone advising, and video advising appointments are just some of the ways you can receive helpful information from our office. Here is a snapshot of these services:

- Video Advising:

 - Faculty, staff and postdocs with employment-based immigration questions (H-1B, TN, O-1, E-3, and Permanent Residency) should email <u>H1B-Employment@jhu.edu</u>
 - Please include details about your present immigration status and a summary of your questions or concerns so that we may connect you with the most appropriate OIS advisor. Phone and video advising is available by appointment between 9:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m.

Preparing to Travel:

Planning to travel this winter? Review the "<u>Travel Information</u>" section of the OIS website and prepare the appropriate documentation before departing the U.S.

- J-1 Exchange Visitors and F-1 Students must request a travel signature at least 10 business days in advance of travel. Instructions <u>here</u>.
- H-1B Employees may request a "<u>Travel Letter</u>" through iHopkins. In addition, all H-1B employees should carry their Form I-797 and other documents listed on the OIS website to demonstrate their continued employment.
- Students on OPT should review specific OPT travel guidance <u>here</u>.


Visa Renewal Information

• Individuals traveling outside of the U.S. with an expired visa should review the information on the OIS website about <u>Visa Renewal</u>.

Returning from Travel

• All students, scholars and employees should immediately retrieve their <u>electronic I-94 record</u> online as soon as they return to the U.S. from travel and review it for any errors.

U.S. Election-Related Resources and Programming

- Election Day in the U.S. is nearly here, and there's a variety of resources to learn about the key issues, get involved, and manage stress and anxiety. While only eligible U.S. citizens are permitted to cast a ballot in the election, international students and scholars can participate in the process by:
 - Encouraging eligible voters to vote. <u>Sign up to volunteer with the Hopkins Votes team</u>.
